


The book was found

This is my first book by Julie Rowe, acquired for Kindle on sale at (I believe) 99¢, and it was good enough that I *will* look for more of her romantic suspense titles ... on sale. I doubt any

will make it among my "keepers shelf" favorite rereads. The intense time-pressure of a deadly outbreak makes the accelerated romance tolerable, though it's more than a little improbable just *how* attracted the H immediately is to the h (for her brains/attitude as much as her looks) *ÃƒÂ¢Ã ¬Ã ·* when she's wearing a hazmat suit, even! It was nice to see a hero who fully respects the heroine's authority in her own field of expertise, though, even as he is powerfully protective of her on the armed-threats front. Some women will probably take offense at his nickname for her, Mouse, but I was more bothered by the fact that the author felt a proposal of marriage was necessary despite the short time frame, to create a HEA ending. I'd have preferred a believable and hopeful HFN. After all, this is the first of a series; surely we could check in on these two briefly in later volumes? The action was pretty gripping and suspenseful, if (again) requiring willful suspension of disbelief: our leads survive being in the proximity of four(?) explosions in the space of about a day! I didn't guess the identity of "Darth Vader", i.e., the person behind the terrorist puppets, though maybe I could have, if I'd tried harder. I like the inclusion of the retired drill sergeant turned bus driver; it was one of the lighter elements, but also showed appreciation for the elder generation's worth and abilities. It's all too realistic (and topical) how young people can be manipulated into believing lies, and seeing random destruction as the answer to bringing about change, and also how some people with influence/authority misuse it in willful ignorance, to potentially disastrous effect. On the medical side, drug-resistant diseases are becoming ever more of a concern even without being engineered *ÃƒÂ¢Ã ¬Ã ·* scary stuff! The book has a number of good lines about the realities of being a soldier in the field, and the philosophy and attitude they bring to the rest of their life, and also about being a civilian who loves one. However, I have to say, I found River inconsistent. At first he tells Ava that "when this is over" he'll be making a move on her *ÃƒÂ¢Ã ¬Ã ·* but then they definitely don't wait til the crisis is over. At least they wait for a moment when they're supposed to be snatching some rest, not while they're actually mid-pursuit of a lead or a suspect/Pol *ÃƒÂ¢Ã ¬Ã ·* I suppose a dose of endorphins is nearly as much of a boost as a longer nap. Then, approaching the end, River annoyed me by falling for a while into the old trope of, "I'm damaged, and my life is dangerous, and I already failed to protect her well enough once. I care about her too much to bring her into all of that risk, so I'll stay away without a word." Aaaarrgh! Furthermore, his "damage", a loss of trust and confidence resulting from a friend's betrayal that left him with comrades dead and 48 hours of mostly-lost memory, is only mentioned when it's convenient for the plot. As for technicalities, I caught a handful of typos, plus one homonym error (shuttered in place of shuddered), but no pervasive, repeated abuses of English language or grammar. (Some indie authors with stellar ratings really make me wonder at how far standards have

fallen.) I think there was at least one of her connected CDC/military series also at 99 cents; let me go grab it while the bargain lasts.

I thoroughly enjoyed this book. I am a huge fan of apocalyptic stories (The Stand, World War Z, The Flu, etc) and I also like a good romance, so having those two things combined was very enjoyable. I believe this was meant to be read after her two previous novels (Deadly Strain, Lethal Game), but I read this one first then purchased the other two since this one was enjoyable. It hints at what happens in the previous novels, but is fine as a standalone. One of my siblings is a neurobiologist focused on Prion disease, and I have heard all about the different biolevels and containment procedures, and this story is spot on with those details. It gives is very realistic and gritty feel to it. Ava is a very badass microbiologist who is researching an outbreak of an antibiotic-resistant bacteria. She's being supported by an equally badass Special Forces soldier, River. There is death, mayhem, secrecy, terrorism, and lots of sex. What more could you want? I was impressed with how frustrating some of the characters were in this story. A few times I wanted to reach in and hit a one of the main characters (this seems to be a specialty of the writer as this happens in her other two novels I mentioned above). The downside to this story is that it is very fast-paced and the characters go from 'meh' to 'love' at an unbelievable pace. They were really there for each other, in all different ways, throughout the entire story, and I loved that. There was definitely some insta-lust happening, but I am so ok with that! Especially as there was a lot keeping them too busy to act on it for a while, so it was constantly simmering beneath the surface. The suspense plot line was scary and exciting, and so well done.
