

Synopsis

In describing the true events surrounding a series of frightening bear attacks in 1980, a bestselling nature/adventure author explores our relationship with the great grizzly. Many citizens of Banff, Alberta, valued living in a place where wildlife grazed on the front lawn; others saw wild bears as a mere roadside attraction. None were expecting the bear attacks that summer, which led to one man's death. Sid Marty's approach to the "story" is intriguing. For more than half the book it is like a mystery as to who/which bear is to blame, this keeps the pages turning but also became a little irritating, if that's possible. I HAVE WATCHED TOURISTS IN GLACIER WATCH BLOND COLORED BLACK BEARS AND TELL ME THE BRUIN IS A GRIZZ. WHO IS TO SAY THAT BLACK BEARS AND GRIZZLIES DON'T DO THE HORIZONTAL MAMBO LIKE POLAR AND ARTIC GRIZZ HAVE DONE AS THEY ARE FORCED INTO LIVING CLOSER.
